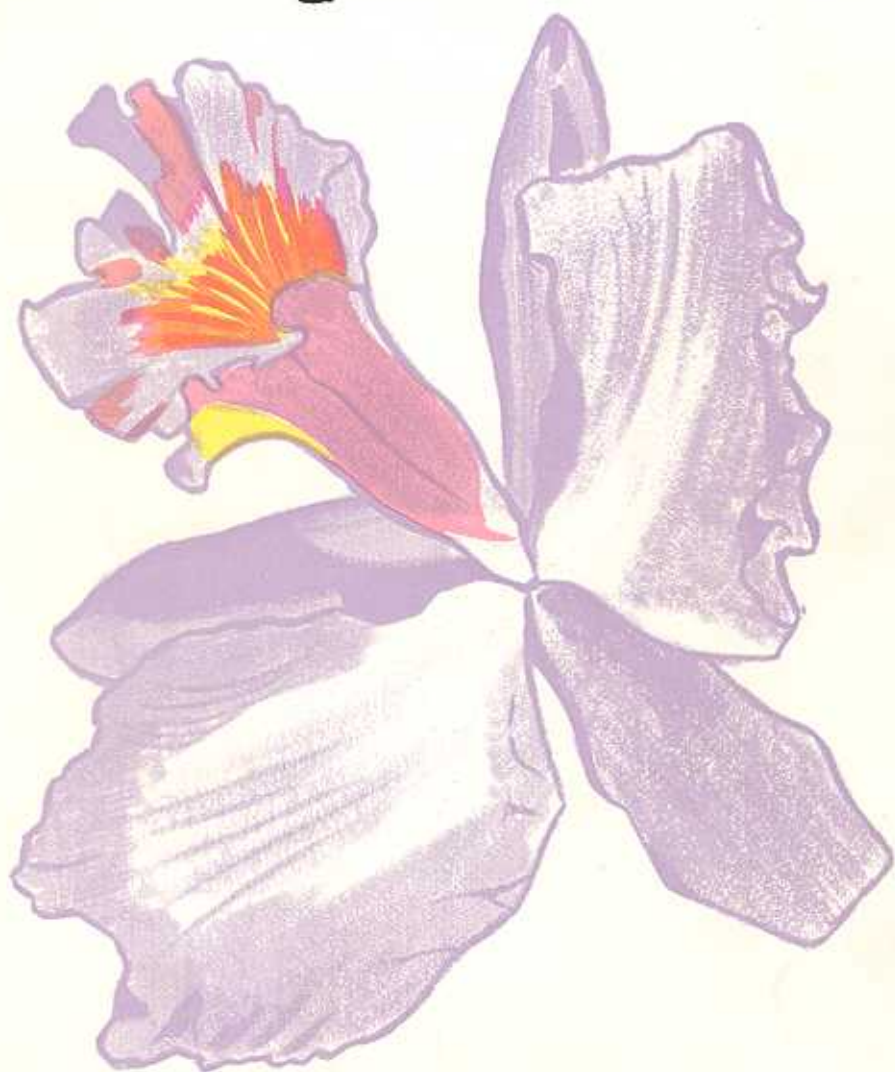

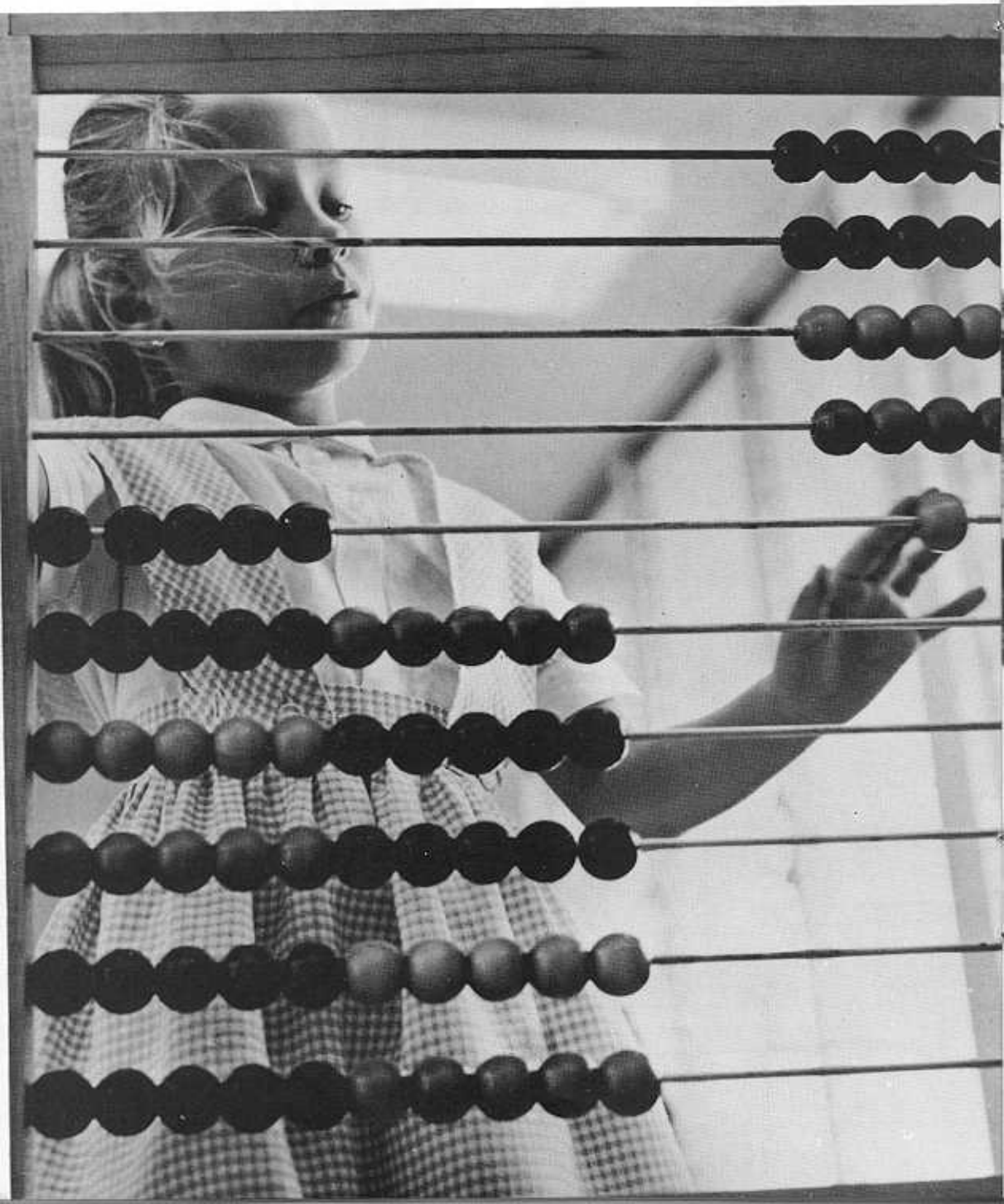

We had fun in the first grade!

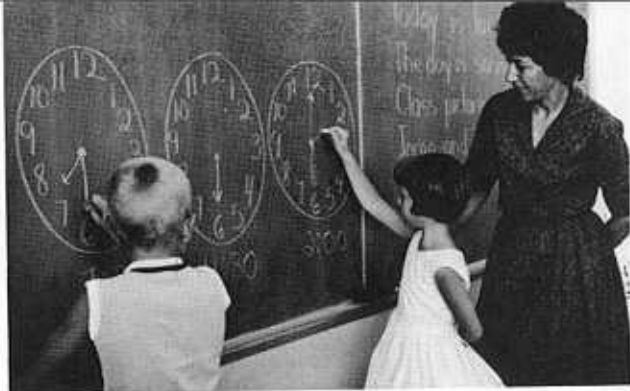
This year we learned to read. We read many good stories in our new readers, science, and social studies books.

Our art work was fun. We painted with brushes, sponges, potatoes, string, and sticks. At Easter we made funny clowns and rabbits from eggs.

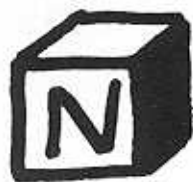

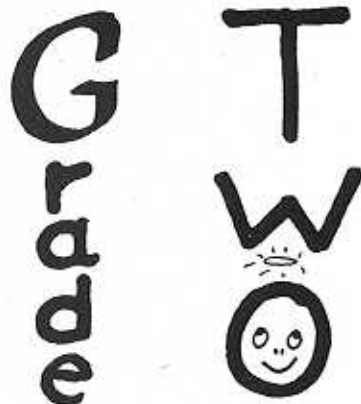
In second grade we begin to grow up. We have many more responsibilities, such as homework and being an example of good behavior to the kindergarten and first grade.

We fourth graders have enjoyed taking a trip around the world in our classroom. We're able to find many interesting and different places on the map that we had never heard of before.

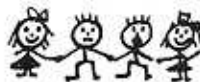
Our Thanksgiving poems were fun to write. We read them for the whole school at the Thanksgiving assembly. They liked them, too.
